*Caritasverband für die Stadt Münster e.V. Familienhilfen - Family Support (Josefstraße 2, 48151 Münster)*

Caritas Münster's home-based family support focuses families in crisis. It addresses families who are no longer able to care adequately for children and can no longer guarantee their well-being. It aims for positive changes in the family environment, to preserve the family and to support in the education of children. In principle, home-based family support addresses all family members. It comes by at home, lasts longer and wants to develop self-help together. Families are given intensive care as well as holistic advice, e.g. also in contact with offices and institutions. The aim is to develop joint solutions to conflicts and crises.

*Zartbitter Münster e.V. Beratungsstelle gegen sexualisierte Gewalt für Jugendliche ab 14 Jahren, Frauen und Männer - Counselling centre against sexualised violence for young people, women and men (Berliner Platz 8, 48143 Münster)*

For more than 30 years, the counselling centre Zartbitter Münster e.V. has been offering help and support for young people aged 14 and over, women and men who have experienced sexualised violence. The term "sexualised violence" makes it clear that it is primarily an act of violence that is expressed through sexual assaults. Sexual acts are instrumentalised in order to exert violence and power. This ultimately distinguishes sexualised violence from physical, psychological and structural violence. The specialists at the counselling centre support victims with a wide range of services (e.g. counselling, group work, prevention, further training) irrespective of nationality, ethnic and social origin, gender, sexual orientation and identity, religion or ideology. Their work is based on the principles of "partiality", "anonymity" as well as "confidentiality" and "no perpetrator work".

*GGUA – Gemeinnütze Gesellschaft zur Unterstützung Asylsuchender e.V.- GGUA Refugee Aid (Hafenstraße 3-5, 48153 Münster)*

The GGUA was founded in 1979 under the name Gemeinnützige Gesellschaft zur Unterstützung Asylsuchender e.V. (non-profit association for the support of asylum seekers). It is a registered association which offers social and residence counselling for refugees. In addition, there are other projects to improve living conditions and the inclusion of refugees and other migrants. For some years now, the GGUA has also been a respected provider of youth welfare services.

The association has about 160 members. More than 200 volunteers and 26 full-time employees as well as several trainees are currently working on various

projects. Currently the following fields of work and projects are offered: Refugee counselling, refugio Münster (psychosocial and therapeutic care for asylum seekers), MAMBA (labour market integration for migrants), asylum procedure counselling, project Q (qualification and training of professionals).

*Stadt Münster Amt für Kinder, Jugendliche und Familien Jugendinformations- und –bildungszentrum (Jib)  
Münster - Youth Information and Education Centre (Hafenstraße 34, 48153 Münster)*

The Jib is a central facility close to the railway station with a wide range of counselling services and further training opportunities for young people aged 16 to 27. The institution is run by the Office for Children, Young People and Families of the City of Münster. The team consists of full-time, part-time, honorary workers and trainees and many volunteers. The Jib offers debtor and application assistance, violence prevention, and the mediation and counselling of an au pair year, a voluntary social year (FSJ) or the Federal Free Willing Service (BFD). Working hours imposed by the court can be done by youths and young adults from 14 to 21 years of age in the workshops. There are also other cultural activities for the young people and multipliers, such as lecture series. 'Gleis 22' with its concerts across the city border is well known and has received several awards.

*Haus der Wohnungslosenhilfe - House of Homeless Help (Bahnhofstraße 62, 48143 Münster)*

The House of Homeless Help (Haus der Wohnungslosenhilfe, HdW) is an institution of the Catholic Bischof-Hermann Foundation. It is integrated into a multifaceted help system for homeless men and women in the city of Münster.

The HdW is a low-threshold accommodation for single homeless men near the railway station. 80 sleeping places are available there. The house also offers an open area where meals are offered at breakfast and lunch time.

Within the framework of initial and basic care, the basic social and health needs are to be ensured and the basis for a referral to the help system is to be created. In addition, a Mobile service is associated with the HdW. The Mobile Service has the task of providing counselling to the homeless. The social workers are supported by medical specialists, so that medical first aid is possible. In parallel, the HDW offers overnight accommodation, the HuK (aid placement and short-term accommodation). There are another 48 places available in 4-bed rooms. The HuK is open from 6:00 p.m. to 9:00 a.m. Social pedagogical advice and relaying is also guaranteed.
